PROJECT HEADLINES

Key achievements of Q2 14/15 reporting period:

Developing standards and performance:

- We have:
 - gathered evidence for 2014/15 review and provided feedback to the CLSB, BSB and CLC on their draft update self-assessment for 2014/15.
 - prepared to receive self- assessments from the beginning of October.
 - rescheduled the 14/15 regulatory standards report to February 2015 due to the late January Board meeting
- We have been preparing for the 2015/16 regulatory standards self assessment by:
 - working on a draft questionnaire to be used to gather third party intelligence information on the performance of the regulators from informed consumers, the regulated community and other interested organisations
 - shifting the self-assessment indicators into direct questions to enable more succinct responses from regulators.
 - developing Board proposals on the proposed approach for the 2015/16 regulatory standards assessment.
- We have reviewed data on SRA ABS performance, raising some specific queries regarding missing
 information. The SRA have indicated that they intend to review the authorisation process and
 simplify. Their performance continues to improve and work-in-progress times are down. We will be
 writing to them to congratulate them but we will continue the monitoring work for the time being.
- We have met BIS officials to discuss proposals for small business appeals champions and how they
 relates to the LSB, approved regulators and our regulatory standards work. Subsequent to this
 meeting, we provided comments to BIS on its proposals and how this initiative might work in the
 legal services sector.

Thematic Reviews

Schedule 13 review:

• Progress is now to a large degree dependent on the SRA progressing a review of its processes and procedures, which it previously indicated it was committed to complete in July. Changes in SRA personnel have meant that there has been a delay to its start and although the SRA still appears open to carrying out a wholesale review, its timetable is as yet unclear and may be longer than originally predicted. SRA have proposed a workshop to discuss issues at the beginning of October. Work will feed into a new IT system due for implementation in March 2015, and potentially into a second system due around 2016.

Section 15 review:

• Finished detailed scoping and developed programme deliverables including specifications for legal review and framework for review of regulatory arrangements

- Completed initial legal analysis which will be used to benchmark existing regulatory arrangements for inhouse/employee practice
- Begun reviewing each approved regulator's regulatory arrangements for in-house/employee practice and drafted an internal working paper summarising desk research on regulatory arrangements for individual lawyers, including comparison of rules, identifying point for clarification
- Held initial discussion with SRA re: their plans for work on in-house practice to manage risk of possible overlap
- Produced and circulated internal briefing note on review
- Reviewed previous LSB publications and decisions, for precedent and lines of inquiry

Regulatory restrictions:

- Completed a review on business ownership restrictions against the regulatory objectives and principles of better regulation and presented report explaining the legislative and regulatory landscape including the better regulatory principles, the regulatory objectives and the consumer principles to the Board at their September meeting.
- Board endorsed conclusions and approved it to be published in October

PROJECT HEADLINES

Key achievements of Q2 14/15 reporting period:

Regulatory reform:

- Scope of work agreed and PID produced.
- Completed review of regulators' rule books to identify common areas to help frame research questions and initial review of published data on approved regulators' income
- Finalised the quantitative and high level survey of providers which will inform the project and generate respondents for a second more in-depth survey. The survey questions have been tested internally and the pilot survey currently underway
- First stakeholder reference group meeting held. A mix of CEOs, finance directors and policy staff from regulators, representative bodies, LeO and the Consumer Panel attended. The session was constructive, with all parties supporting both streams of the project.
- Communications work to raise profile of project and drive responses to questionnaire including:
 - Mention in Mike Pitt's speech to Westminster Policy Forum
 - New page on website

Liberalising the legal workforce:

Education and training:

 Maintained interest in changes made to education and training regulations by approved regulators including scanning consultations, rules applications, checking press cuttings and reviewing regulators' websites to identify relevant changes.

Diversity:

- Ongoing monitoring of approved regulators' work on diversity including:
 - Reviewed BSB report on their 2013/14 supervision exercise on compliance with the equality rules in the BSB Handbook
 - Obtained an update from IPReg on progress with the analysis of the diversity data they have collected
 - Reviewed IPS's 2014 diversity report and agreed how they would present their data in a sector wide data set
 - Identified gaps in the published diversity data that need to be filled to allow the compilation of a sector wide diversity data set
- Met Judicial Appointments Commission to discuss their work to increase the diversity of applicants to judicial office and subsequently provided them with information support their work.
- Published a press release welcoming the latest report from the Social Mobility and Child Poverty Commission. The report highlighted the over-representation of those educated at independent schools and Oxbridge in the senior levels of Britain's institutions and called for greater publication of diversity data and more flexible routes into professions. Wrote to them following a subsequent request for

information.

Improving the consumer experience: Quality:

- Completed analysis of the regulators' positions in relation to the quality success criteria published in our
 'Approaches to quality' consultation response document, and wrote to the regulators to remind them that in
 the 2015/16 regulatory standards exercise we will be looking for specific evidence that they are taking action
 to deliver the success criteria, highlighting we are aware of only a limited number of examples of their activity
 in relation to the positive indicators of success. We received responses from BSB, IPReg and SRA and have set
 up meetings with them to discuss their activity.
- Replied to a letter from TLS which provided confirmation that the information collected by the SRA for regulatory purposes should be publically available and that this data is owned by the SRA
- Following their response or non-response to the joint letters sent by the LSB and Consumer Panel after the roundtable on regulators opening up of their data to third parties, we have sent further letters and emails to some of the regulators to maintain momentum with this work. Good recent progress with SRA, IPReg. CLSB, IPS and Master of Faculties. We have now also met the Consumer Panel to discuss and agree the next steps with this work
- Held a meeting with the Legal Ombudsman to discuss our response to the interim Section 120 report from the
 OLC on complaints received by the Ombudsman concerning transparency of the cost of legal services, and
 clarify our expectations for the final report due in April 2015
- Met the Competition and Markets Authority to discuss research on the availability of quality and price
 information for legal services for individual consumers. This work has since been put on hold due to recent
 progress by regulators on making core datasets available.
- Some milestones are due to be reprioritised until 2015 and 2016 due to changing priorities in the organisation and a lack of resources to complete the work (see project milestones)

Complaints:

- Responses received from the BSB and SRA on joint working initiatives to ensure barristers get the necessary cooperation of solicitors in meeting their complaint signposting obligations. They have agreed two milestones over the next 6 months:
 - September respective supervision teams will meet to discuss general protocols and procedures for collaborative working and information sharing across all supervisory activity
 - November they will meet again to discuss evidence of levels of compliance and barriers to success relating to client notification. Further actions to improve success rates will then be agreed.
- Further consideration of the Claims Management Regulator's Complaint Handling Rules. This includes seeking clarification on whether LeO will have ability to consider historic complaints (in relation to events before the CMCs become approved persons under the LSA). It now appears that an amendment will be needed to the LSA under \$208.

Research:

- Managed ongoing projects through tender evaluations, contract finalisation, meetings and end communications including:
 - Published report into What lessons can be learned from the personal injury market?
 - Continued oversight management of Online Divorce research
 - Finalised legal terms of reference for joint SRA project *on Innovation: capabilities and barriers in legal service.* Research team project kick off meeting held. ARs approached to assist in case studies participants.
 - Legal needs survey Met Legal Education Foundation Chief Executive, and agreed scoping paper for LEF board approval.

- Delivered presentation to the International Regulators Conference, 9 July
- Responded to MoJ request for information on a review of the legal services market.
- Review of ADR schemes have been rescheduled to be completed in 2015/16 as part of the full market Evaluation report.

Notable activities during the July- September period:

- The new Chair of the LSB made his first public speech to the *Westminster Legal Policy Forum* event on the future of legal services regulation on 4 September.
- The Strategy Director spoke at a Notaries' conference in Cambridge which was attended by just over 1/8 of all notaries in England and Wales.
- Interviews provided to a number of trade publications including Modern Law, Legal Futures and Counsel Magazine. An explanatory article on recent LSB research was provided to Legal Action magazine.
- A roundtable event was organised to introduce the new Chairman to the legal trade press.
