Title:	Regulation of non-commercial bodies – consultation paper

Summary:

The introduction of Alternative Business Structures (ABS) means that legal services providers with non-lawyer owners and/or managers need to be licensed to provide reserved legal activities. Some organisations, such as not for profit agencies (for example Law Centres and Citizens' Advice Bureaux) and Community Interest Companies are given protection for a transitional period, which means that they can currently provide reserved legal services without a licence. Only the Legal Services Board (LSB) can make a recommendation to the Lord Chancellor that he should end the transitional protection.

The Board discussed its approach to the regulation of these bodies at its January 2012 meeting and agreed to consult on how they should be regulated.

Attached at **Annex A** is a draft consultation paper. A draft impact assessment is also being developed.

The Board should note that, in addition to the issues discussed in January, we have also invited comment on our view that it is inappropriate for licensing authorities to have blanket bans on these bodies being able to charge consumers who can afford to pay something towards the cost of legal advice and that we expect any regulator to allow a full range of business structures and to impose restrictions only when there is evidence that they are necessary to prevent harm to consumers (see paragraphs 41-47).

- (1) Comment on the draft consultation paper
- (2) Delegate authority to the Chairman and Chief Executive to agree publication of the consultation paper and draft impact assessment
