The report contains all of the fields requested by MoJ, including headline risks for each project, a quarterly report on regulatory arrangements applications, a quarterly report from the Consumer Panel and a brief narrative cover paper to provide some further context for the report.

Legal Services Board Q1 Performance Report

Overview of the Quarter

- The programme highlight report at Appendix 1 provides a comprehensive overview of the Board's work to deliver its Business Plan during Q1 2012/13. The report is based upon the LSB's overarching programme and individual project plans.
- Attached at Appendix 2 is a quarterly report on Consumer Panel activity, and at Appendix 3 is an overview of our work in relation to requests for approval to alterations of regulatory arrangements.
- 3. Based on an assessment of the status of individual projects, the LSB judges the status of its overarching programme to deliver its Business Plan at the end of Q1 of 2012/13 and thus its regulatory responsibilities is GREEN.
- 4. Matters of note not specifically addressed by the programme report include the following:

Organisation development and governance

- 5. During April June 2012:
 - We filled three vacancies (see below) and our budgeted headcount remains at 30:
 - Tom Peplow has joined as Regulatory Associate initially focusing on Workforce Development
 - Harriet Gamper has joined as the Consumer Panel Associate
 - Vincent McGovern has joined the LSB as Communications Manager
 - We completed annual performance appraisals and, following discussion at the Board's Remuneration and Nomination Committee, we are preparing our Pay Remit. This will be in line with HM Treasury guidance.
 - Board Members were made aware that Sir Suma Chakrabarti, Permanent Secretary, MoJ had recently been elected as the next President of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development from 3 July 2012. We have made contact with Sir Suma in his new role, given the interest of other International Financial Institutions in legal services reform.

- We implemented changes to our website to ensure compliance with new cookies legislation. We have also received an advisory visit (at LSB request) from the Information Commissioner's Office to review our data protection policies and processes.
- Our Annual Report was laid in Parliament. This included an unqualified audit opinion from the NAO, secured before the end of May, ensuring that we were in line with the timescale for consolidation of accounts.

Triennial review

 At time of drafting we await publication of the Triennial Review. There has been a degree of trade press coverage of responses to the Triennial Review. We addressed many of these during our successful media briefing to accompany the launch of our Baseline Market Impact Report and Business Plan which took place on 3 April. This provided an ideal and useful opportunity to engage in an open and frank manner with a variety of interested commentators and we received informed coverage of our findings, and our general position, as a result.

Relations with the Ministry

- We continue to engage with data and information requests from the Ministry (and Cabinet Office via the Ministry). We also met the Ministry's Head of Internal Audit who is likely to wish to attend LSB Audit and Risk Committee meetings in due course.
- We have resurrected a quarterly tripartite meeting for MoJ/LSB/LeO and one has been held in the past quarter. This presents an ideal opportunity to discuss matters of shared interest.
- The Chairman and Chief Executive had their annual meeting with Jonathan Djanogly which included formal presentation of our Annual Report.

Relations with OLC

- Held Joint Board meeting with OLC, which included discussion of shared challenges and likely developments in the legal services sector.
- CEO attended LeO ARC meeting
- Regular LSB/LeO Chair and Chief Executive Four way meeting held
- Two meetings of forum to discuss redress and regulation held including nonexecutive representatives from each organisation in order to understand mutual timetables, issues and risk

Stakeholder relations

During April – June 2012

- We have taken part in a number of useful speaking events, a number of which secured good media coverage of our robust positioning. In particular, the Chairman's speech to a seminar held by Russell-Cooke, chaired by the Master of the Rolls and which also included submissions by the incoming Bar Council Chair and current Law Society President proved especially interesting to trade commentators. Similarly robust messages were also given when the Chairman addressed Law Society Council, prompting much less strong reaction than on previous similar occasions.
- Less newsworthy but equally positive from a stakeholder engagement perspective, Chris Kenny spoke on a panel with Lord Falconer to an SRA seminar on the future regulation, to a mixed financial services and legal conference on ABS hosted by SIFA and at a separate event hosted by the ACL and on 23 May spoke at an event on the Future of the Bar with the Chairman of the Bar Council.
- We concluded our series of events supporting the legal education and training review with a very well received event in Cardiff on 10 May. Our understanding is that the review team will be unveiling their proposals at or immediately after the SRA's symposium on 10/11 July, so we will be working towards an assessment of them by the September Board. Our discussion paper for the seminars has been helpful in moving the team to explore more radical options, but colleagues will have noticed concern from commentators such as Stephen Mayson about the review dealing too narrowly with questions of existing qualifications to the exclusion of broader workforce issues.
