PROJECT HEADLINES

Key achievements of Q3 12/13 reporting period:

Self assessment for the approved regulators:

- 1. Published report of regulatory assessments for CLC, IPReg, IPS and the Faculty Office. The regulators were given the opportunity to comment on the reports before publication and the CEO and Chairman of each regulator met with the LSB CEO and Chairman to discuss their action plans.
- 2. The final reports did attract some criticism from CLSB and IPS, we have made clear that we stand by our assessment and do not intend to debate individual conclusions in the document. We also indicated that we are happy to discuss how each regulator can develop further against the indicators.
- 3. Final self-assessment has been received from SRA and the review has been completed.

Review of regulatory sanctions and appeals processes:

- 1. Scope of the project has been reviewed and redefined and a Project Manager has been assigned to the work. A revised PID and project plan has been developed and agreed by the Gateway Group reflecting the new objectives
- 2. Key objective of the work is to continue research and review the work with a view to producing a discussion document by the end of the 2013/14 business year which sets out:
 - The current systems and issues of consumer detriment or poor regulation that they raise
 - A system for sanction and appeals arrangements that meets the characteristics of what we consider to be effective arrangements
 - The barriers to achieving the ideal system
 - Options for change
- 3. We have scoped the legal research requirements for establishing the legal framework that underpins the current sanctions and appeals arrangements.
- 4. Once the main review is complete we will need to contact regulators informally to test out our factual understanding. This will need careful handling to ensure that regulators understand that this does not mean that the LSB are about to propose a radical change.

- 2. Director of Regulatory Practice attended discussion at Legal Ombudsman about findings from YouGov survey
- 3. Approved regulators currently undertaking steps towards meeting the outcomes of the bespoke frameworks that were sent to them in Q2.

PROJECT HEADLINES

Key achievements of Q3 12/13 reporting period:

Scope of Regulation:

- 1. The following papers were published in relation to the investigation into the regulation of will-writing activities and estate administration activities and closed on 8 November:
 - a) Summary of feedback to consultation and LSB response
 - For consultation -
 - b) A Provisional Report stating that the Board is minded to recommend that the list of reserved activities is amended and the reasons for its decision
 - c) Draft Section 162 guidance for prospective approved regulators for consultation to help them develop their regulatory arrangements
 - d) Updated impact assessment
 - e) Preliminary equalities impact assessment
- 2. Analysis of responses to consultation on the provisional reports and associated documents re: willwriting, probate and estate investigations and presented paper to Board outlining developing thinking.
- 3. Held a number of meetings with consultees and received additional quantitative information from the will-writing representative bodies and also from ICAEW
- 4. Held two meetings of joint LSB/MoJ implementation Project Board
- 5. Discussed with the Board emerging thinking on estate administration
- 6. Finalised the impact assessment for will-writing activities in discussions with MoJ economists (subject to Board approval)
- 7. Board agreed proposed approach and timetable to reviewing protections in relation to legal advice for individual consumers

Education and Training:

- 1. Completed review of education and training provider market
- 2. Started mapping current regulatory arrangement for education and training
- 3. Begun developing high level policy framework for education and training to be used in engaging with the outcome of the LETR
- 4. Attended meeting of the LETR Consultative Steering Panel which included a discussion around emerging recommendations
- 5. Held CEO level meeting with LETR commissioning regulators to confirm shared understanding of the review's emerging recommendations and discuss next steps. The emerging recommendations largely meet the Board's aims in relation to flexibility. The SRA is currently reviewing its regulations to simplify processes and where possible remove unnecessary regulations, as evidenced by the recent 'Red Tape Challenge' publication (where 6 of the 10 recommended changes relate to education and training). The other regulators are expected to undertake similar reviews in response to the reports publication. Substantive Regulator board discussions are scheduled to take place in March/ April
- 6. We have noted the view of the BSB that, "subject to certain adjustments currently in train, the necessary work has been done by the Wood reviews for the BSB on the Bar Vocational Course (now Bar Professional

Training Course - BPTC) and pupillage, and that the current system of training for the Bar is, indeed, fit for purpose." This contrasts with the view put forward in the LETR paper. We have not yet discussed this with the BSB but will do so in the context of the emerging recommendations.

Diversity:

- 1. Following publication of the Judicial Diversity Taskforce Annual report in September we have met with colleagues from the MoJ to discuss the connections between work on judicial diversity and the role of regulation in addressing diversity issues ore broadly.
- 2. Continued monitoring of AR progress against the diversity data collection and publication timeline, including discussions with CILEX, SRA and BSB. The BSB will not know the outcome of the chambers monitoring programme until summer 2013 once the planned compliance exercise has finished. The SRA has reported 44% compliance within firms and plans to publish aggregated data early in 2013. The low disclosure rate on the BSB's data collection exercise for individual barristers has been picked up by Legal Futures following the Board discussion. This will be perceived as a stark contrast to the relative success of the SRA data collection exercise and will need to be factored into our review planning
- 3. Agreed scope and completed literature review of the issues in relation to the equality of pay across legal services (as indicated in the Business Plan).
- 4. Followed up on November meeting with the SRA, TLS and city firms in relation to concerns regarding the model questionnaire and indicating our intention to review the process in 2013

Quality

- 1. Completed review of QASA consultation and provided feedback to Joint Advisory Group
- Continued discussions with the JAG members at CEO and Chair level in relation to the final details of the QASA scheme. JAG has announced its agreement on a way forward following the fourth consultation. The revised timetable will be announced in January 2013
- 3. Project Manager attended training session for judges on judicial evaluation for QASA
- 4. Sent letter to BSB, IPReg, IPS and CLC asking them to consider the Consumer Panel's report on comparison websites and to let us know what actions they plan to address the issues identified

Research

- 1. Launched LSB research pages
- 2. Initiated the following research projects: Small Business Consumers, behavioural economics, financial protection and understanding consumers.
- 3. Sent out research specifications for the data analysis project but are now reviewing a plan to undertake the work in-house.
- 4. Updating knowledge bank, and Maps of legal services in line with new research findings and revised data in preparation for publication on research website.
- 5. Developed scoring system for research project tender evaluations following internal audit exercise.
- 6. Received draft reports on:
 - i. the cab rank rule
 - ii. value of regulation
- iii. advocacy quality measures

- 2. Scope out plans for review of AR diversity data collection and publication
- 3. Develop communications plan for publication of literature review on equal pay

Quality Assurance

 Announcement of revised timetable for implementation of QASA. We will continue discussions both at working and CEO level in relation to QASA implementation to ensure that the delay to the original timetable is minimised and to manage the risk of further issues arising as JAG seek to address the remaining technical issues arising from consultation. A meeting is scheduled between JAG and LSB colleagues on 21 January but we will seek to confirm the timetable as soon as possible to ensure momentum is maintained
